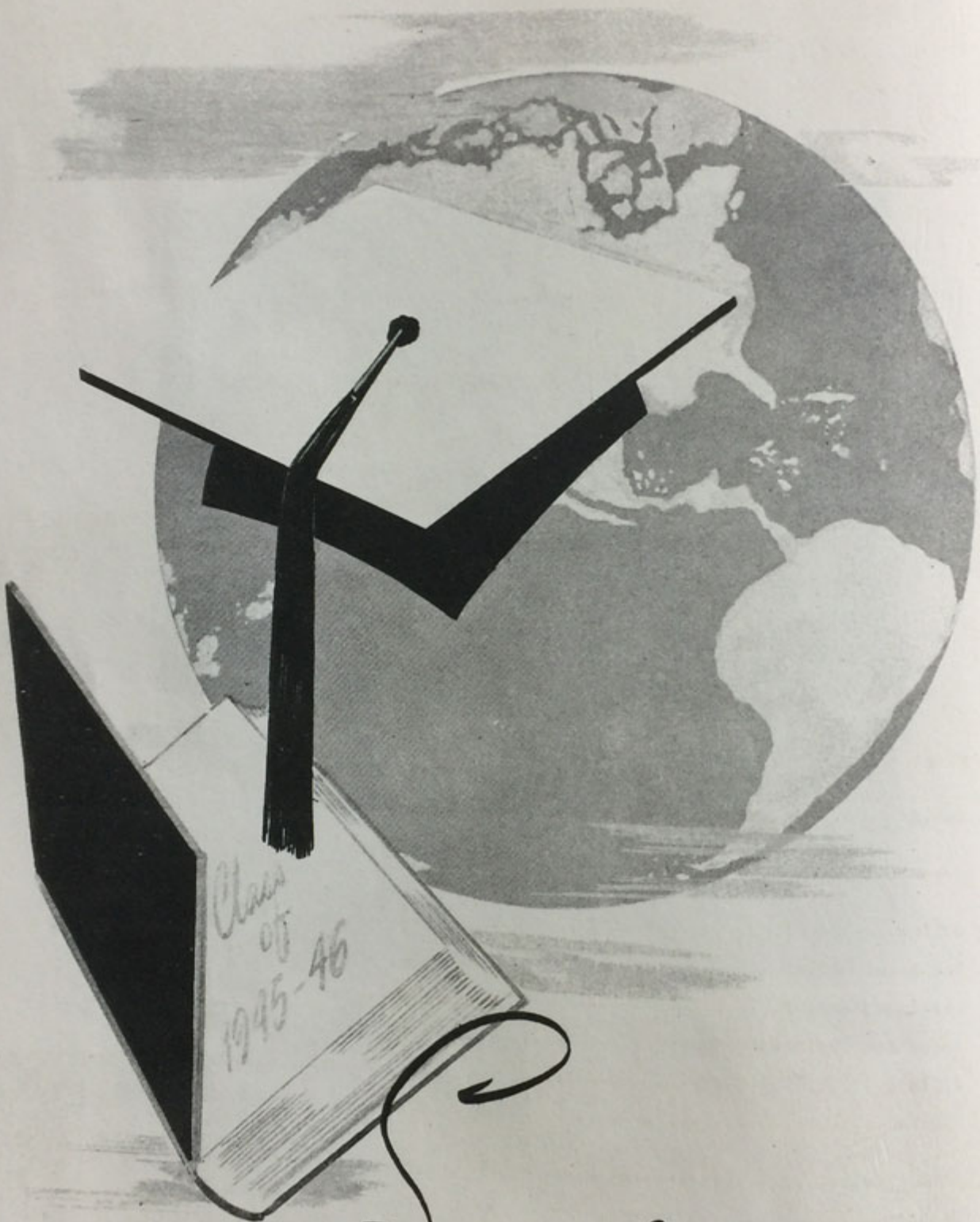

CLASS HISTORY

In September 1939, the members of the class of '51 entered into the first mysteries of education. Miss Vaughn was the teacher for our first year. Only six of us, who started on that bright morning twelve long years ago; are still with our class. Joan Garis, Shirley Gathany, Pauline Kime, Ira Foote, Wayne Bush, and Joan Gilroy. After drying our eyes, we soon reached our first important goal; a bright shiny penny! We had counted to one hundred.

Our second year at school, found us learning our times tables. In third grade on November 14, 1942, a great disaster took place in our lives; our gymnasium burned to the ground. Miss Hart was our teacher for this year.

Mrs. Thomas came to teach in our fourth year; also, our friend, Norma Eastman, became our classmate; she came to us from Binghamton. We advanced to Mrs. McCormick's room in the fifth grade. That year, we learned all the states and their capitals. During our sixth year in school, we acquired our class joker, Pat Locmis. At the end of that year, we were all excited over passing and advancing into junior high school; to be with the "big kids" and our seventh grade was mischievous; Mrs. Austin, our home room teacher, had quite a time making us act like ladies and gentlemen - she has finally succeeded???? Ernest Maino became our classmate that year. Eighth grade found us down stairs in Miss Gorman's room. Mary Lou Vreeland and Ben Tomeo became our classmates. During basketball season, three of our girls became cheerleaders; Joan Gilroy, Shirley Gathany, and Pauline Kime. At the end of the year, all were relieved to find we had passed our standardized tests.

In our freshman year, our home room was in the laboratory. Mr. Fox was our home room teacher. Our studies became harder as we entered into the advanced mysteries of education. General science was much different to us; we enjoyed it most, when Mr. Thomas and Miss Gorman took our class, and the biology class, to Kitchen's Creek. We all struggled through to the end of the year. Two of our classmates, David Hughes and Jim Sackett, left us to join Uncle Sam's army.

Our sophomore year was very exciting; our home room was in Miss Demer's room with the juniors and seniors. During the fall, everybody in the high school went on a trip, to see the State Police Rodeo, in the Scranton Ball Park. On our way, we visited Nay Aug Park, also the coal mines and breakers. Six of our girls and two boys made the basketball teams that year. They were Shirley Pauline, Norma, Pat, Mary Lou, Ira, Ernest and Ben. The girls won their first game, with Pat and Pauline playing a wonderful game at forward. Our class officers for the year were; Ernest-President, Joan Gilroy-Secretary, Shirley-Treasurer, and Mrs. Austin became our class advisor. The year ended with our class losing one classmate, Elsie Swavola, but Kate Hughes had become our classmate this year so we would enter into our junior year with our ever lucky number, thirteen. Looking back over the year, we found we were ready for our summervacation. Our schedule for the year had been heavy, and school lunches had kept us busy for some weeks.

Our junior year could be said never to have had a dull moment, for now we were sharing our classes with the seniors. We enjoyed our studies, for the most part. F. O. D. was very interesting; English Literature and geometry were much different from our past studies. We elected our officers and chose our rings early in the year. Our good friends and buddies, the seniors, had only two girls, so the junior girls did much to help in senior activities.

When basketball season opened, we had four girls and three boys on the team. Our girls team was unsuccessful, but we were almost as proud of our boys as we were of our beautiful new gymnasium, which was finished in time for the second half of basketball season. As soon as we started playing in our new gymnasium, we all tried to show our appreciation by winning a game. The boys played wonderfully well, and the girls were proud of their improvement.

The Junior-Senior Play, "Here Comes Charlie", was the first play Great Bend High had presented in four years. The annual banquet given for the faculty and seniors, was the best farewell gift we could think of for our class friends, the seniors. We were the first class to provide our own entertainment, a vocal solo, a piano solo, a vocal duet, and readings.

Soon the year was over, and it was graduation time, the first in our new gymnasium. The juniors followed the old custom of Great Bend High, that of being ushers and of carrying flowers. It hardly seemed true that now we had the title of seniors, for our friends had passed into the unprotected outside world.

This year had been a happy year; one we shall never forget.

Summer vacation was soon over and we found our selves back in our old home room, only it looked different; the whole interior of the school had been painted; an improvement which made us feel rather special this year. Many changes had been made all around. The tenth grade was no longer in our room. Our new room-mates, besides the juniors, were the freshman class. We had two new teachers, Mrs. Parks for home economics and Mr. Graham for music. Our classmates had also changed; Mary Lou Vreeland had left us, but we had gained our "little shorty", Joan Teel, from Springville. Our first activity was a dance which was a big success. Slim Williams played for it and W. K. O. P. made a tape recording of the program. Two seniors, Norma and Ira, were heard over the radio the next morning. In October, we made our first trip to New York; we all had an exciting time.

In November, we had turkey for the annual election supper, which was also a big success. Soon, it was basketball season, and four seniors were on the first teams, Pauline, Norma, Shirley, and Ernie. Ira was unable to play this year due to an operation on his foot. The victories were reversed this year, with the boys losing and the girls on the winning side. Right at the beginning of the year, the girls proved this year would be different.

After Christmas vacation we had grown quite used to our title of "Seniors". In January, Eleanor Loucks left our class to plan her coming marriage to Searle Ampett. We now found we had only twelve in our class, but we soon regained our lucky number thirteen, for Richard Reed, from Oakland, had joined our class. Our work on the yearbook was soon filling our spare moments. Pictures, writings, articles, advertisements, printing, all presented many problems to be solved. At last, it was completed!

Now, nearing graduation, our time is filled with preparing for our class night, baccalaureate, and commencement and our trip to Washington. We look back over the long years spent in Great Bend High; close in our hearts we shall always hold their memories.

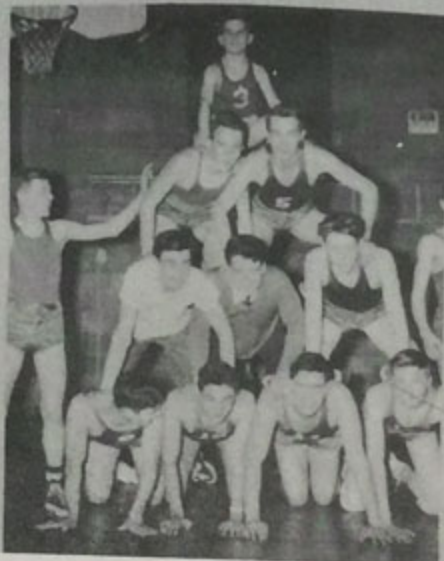
THE CLASS WILL

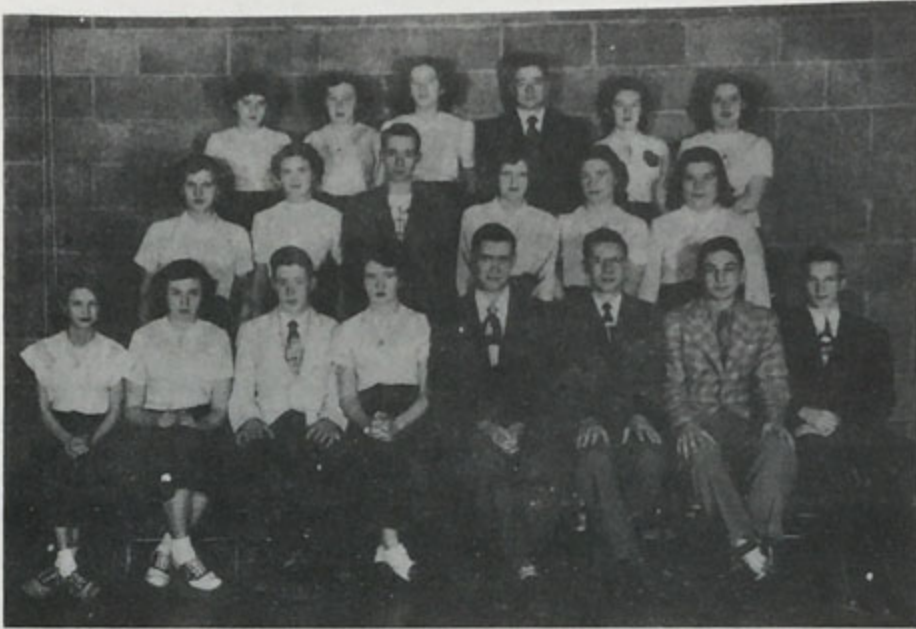

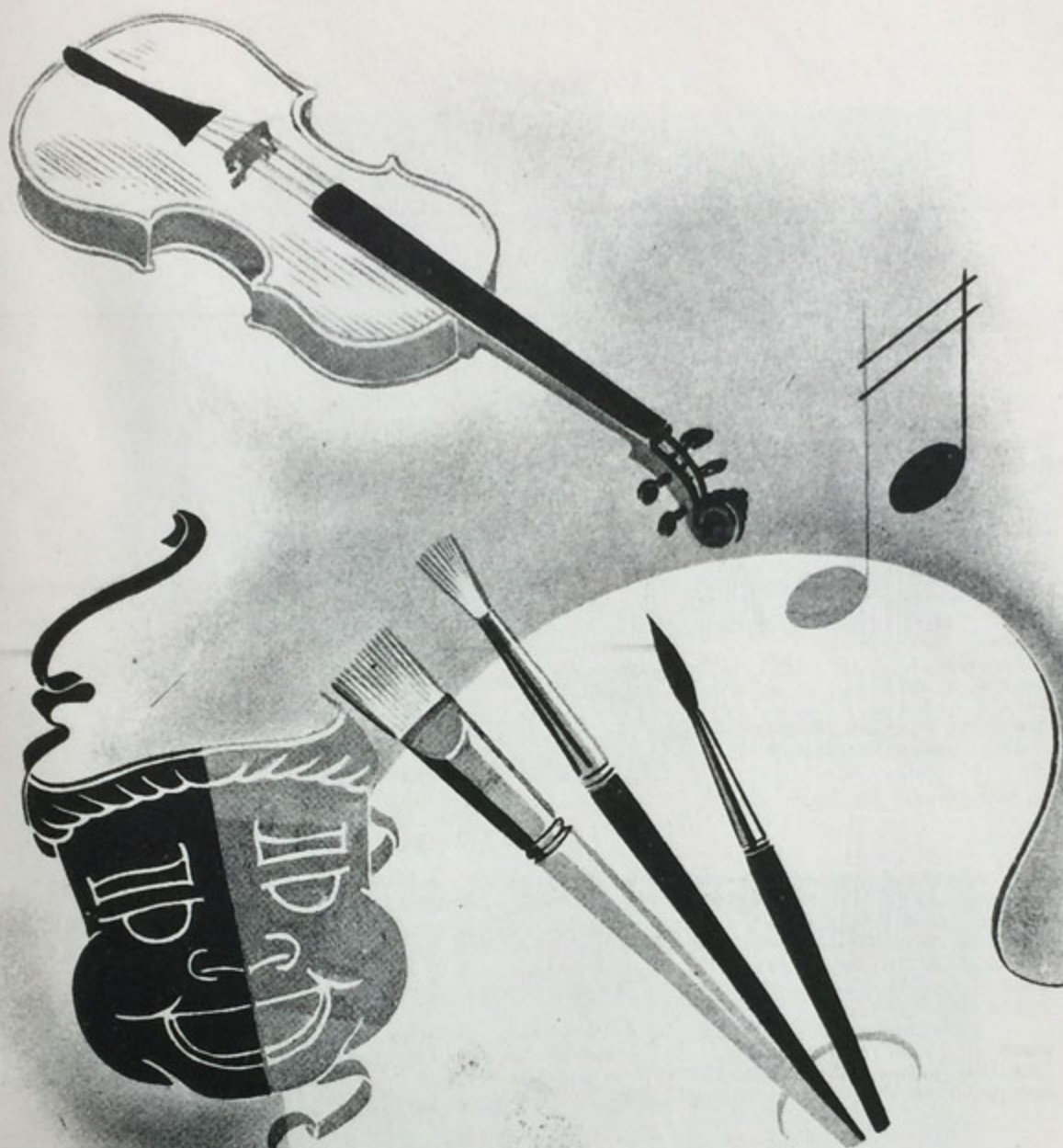

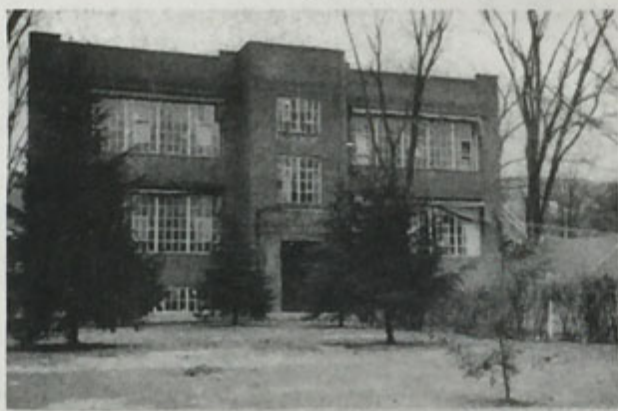
