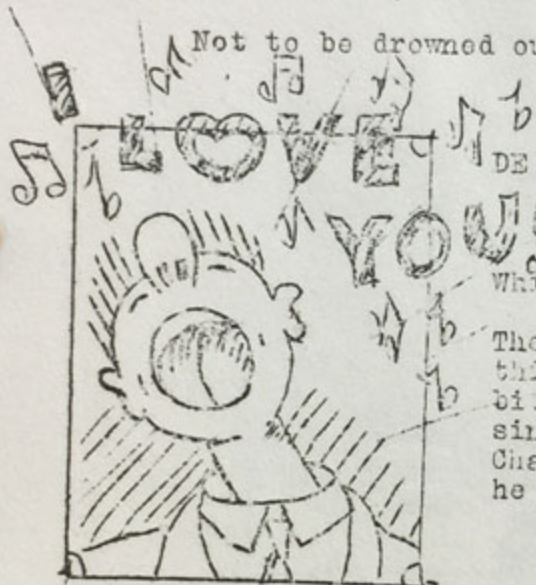

Early in December of 1932 a meeting was held in the Principal's office to plan the reorganization of the association. At this meeting several different classes were represented but it was decided to wait until a more general representation was present before doing anything in the way of organizing.

Notices were posted to the effect that following the annual Alumni Basket Ball games, which were held in Christmas Vacation week, a meeting of all alumni present would be held. At that meeting there were about fifty former graduates.

On a motion by Harry Donley of the class of 1930 a committee was appointed and Everett Clinton of the class of 1932 was elected Chairman and Margaret Hand, also of the class of '32 was elected Secretary and ~~chairman~~ treasurer.

Since that time much has been done. A fairly complete list has been made and notices sent to all who are on this list. It has also been published in numerous newspapers that there would be a reunion and banquet May 24, 1933.

As this is written something over 100 reservations for this occasion have been received. It is hoped that the evening will be conducted to the enjoyment of all and that many similar occasions will be held in future years.

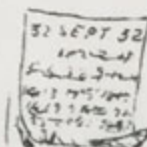

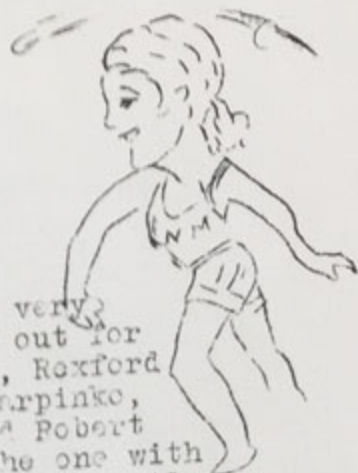

ATHLETICS



BASEBALL Last fall the base ball season was very successful. A good array of material came out for practice. Of those who came out Jay Price, Rexford Smith, Lloyd Stevens, Paul Donley, Paul Karpinko, George Hallstead, Donald Gillespie, Ellis Wilder, and Robert Richardson earned their letters. Every game except the one with Oakland was one and that was lost by an 11-10 score. We rightly feel proud of the excellent work of the team.

BASKET BALL When basket ball season rolled around, Mr. Wilkinson and Miss Hubler had many people to work with. The girls who won their letters were Maude Powers, Camilla Aldrich, Doris Hall, Leona Williams, Ruth Dearborn, Bessie Tyler. The boys who won their letters were Robert Richardson, Lloyd Stevens, Charles DeZube, Donald Gillespie, Ellis Wilder, Ronald Richardson, and Paul Karpinko.

TRACK Early in the spring practice began for the annual track meet which was held this year on the New Milford field. For a while some of the boys practiced as early as five o'clock in the morning. On May 5 New Milford was easily winner of the preliminary meet between New Milford, Hallstead and Hartford.

In the county meet, May 13, we did not fare quite as well, due to the additional competition and the injury to Linus Moore which greatly handicapped our team. Some statistics on the county meet follow: Orchestra-fourth place; Class A. chorus- fourth place; Class C chorus- FIRST place. Robert Richardson in taking first place in the broad jump broke the county record of nineteen feet by a leap of 19 ft. four inches. The class C relay team broke the county record for the quarter mile relay of 56.8 seconds by 1.8 seconds.

In class A. the final results of the meet were: Susquehanna, first place; Hartrose, second place; New Milford, third place. Letters for track were awarded to Robert Richardson, Bessie Tyler, Mary Tiffany, Doris Hall, and Elsie Ransom.

A district meet combining the counties of Susquehanna, Wayne, Wyoming and York is scheduled for May 20 but as this book is in preparation before that date no account of the results is possible.

Through the aid of Professor Phillips, Professor Carr, and a very efficient group of teachers, seventeen of us have followed the ever-repeating words of our motto, "Onward and Upward".

Generally speaking, we were quite a studious group. We neither talked out loud nor threw chalk except when the teacher was called out of the room. We were never known to get up petitions, unless we desired special favors. We were so anxious to gain an education that we never allowed class recitation to cease because there was no teacher in charge. Charles DeZuba and Edwin Mosher were always willing to attend to disciplinary problems and the less needed text instructions. Lest you should gain the impression from these facts that we were not exactly human I shall turn to the pages of our history upon which our various undertakings for increasing our bank account are recorded.

In our Sophomore year we had a very successful postal card social. We might have had at least one more but we were unable to persuade Ehemer Darrow to extend an invitation.

Frequent bake sales were made possible through the kind hospitality of Mr. Charles L. Benjamin.

Last year many of our schoolmates patronized us by the purchase of felt emblems bearing the letters of our school.

During our Senior year we sponsored two movies, "The Life of George Washington" and "the Pony Express"; and we had two successful card parties. Due to our belief that the physical as well as the social needs of the body should be cared for, we have had suppers, sold candy and sold chances on groceries.

The last enterprise of our Senior Year was the publication of the year book.

Although the convalescing treasury has benefited by these undertakings, all of our effort has not been exerted for the purpose of increasing our finances. We have aimed to contribute toward the welfare of our school. We have accomplished these obligations through participation in athletics, music and scholarship.

Camilla Aldrich, Maude Powers, Leona Williams and Ruth Dearborn have displayed notable ability and sportsmanship in our basket ball games and track activities.

Charles DeZuba, Robert Richardson and Edwin Mosher have proven their efficiency in basket ball, base ball and track.

Our class has been well represented in chorus for track and for operettas which have been produced from time to time.

Janet Artley, Maude Powers, Edwin Mosher and I have tried to be faithful members of the orchestra.

Jessie Aldrich and May Lawrence won first and second awards respectively for an essay on "This World and the Youth of To-Day", sponsored by the New Milford Civic Club in 1932.

We have proved to be quite efficient actors as shown by participation in "Peggy and the Pirate" 1930; "The Belle of Bagdad" 1931; "O, Professor" 1932; "Up in the Air" 1933, and that most thrilling production, "Girl Shy" 1933.

Through these various attempts we have not only aimed to better the standards of our school but we have also endeavored to improve the welfare of our schoolmates and friends. With this purpose in view we felt highly honored with the privilege of presenting the cornerstone for this cherished school of ours. This building has sheltered our disappointments and woes, our successes and joys.




Likewise, we make, constitute and appoint the Faculty of the New Milford High School to be executors of this our last will and testament.

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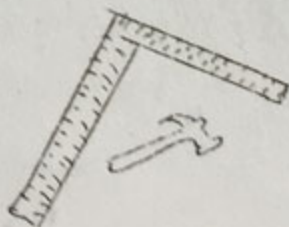
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
