Although two members are being lost through graduation, the Debating Club will function again in 1937-1938.



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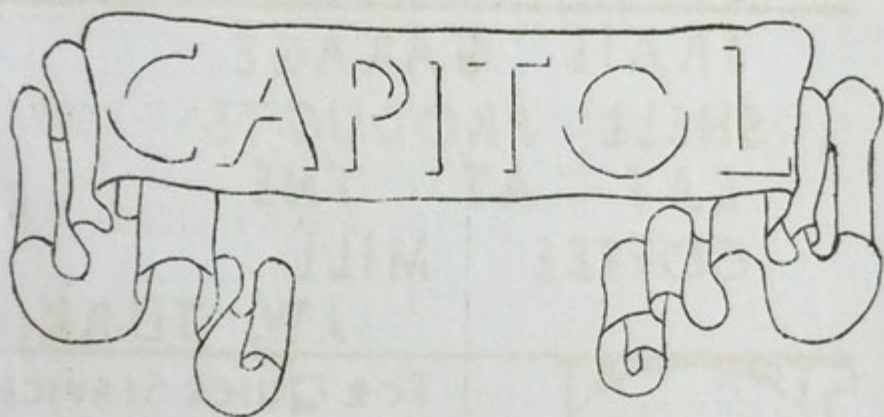
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
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

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
