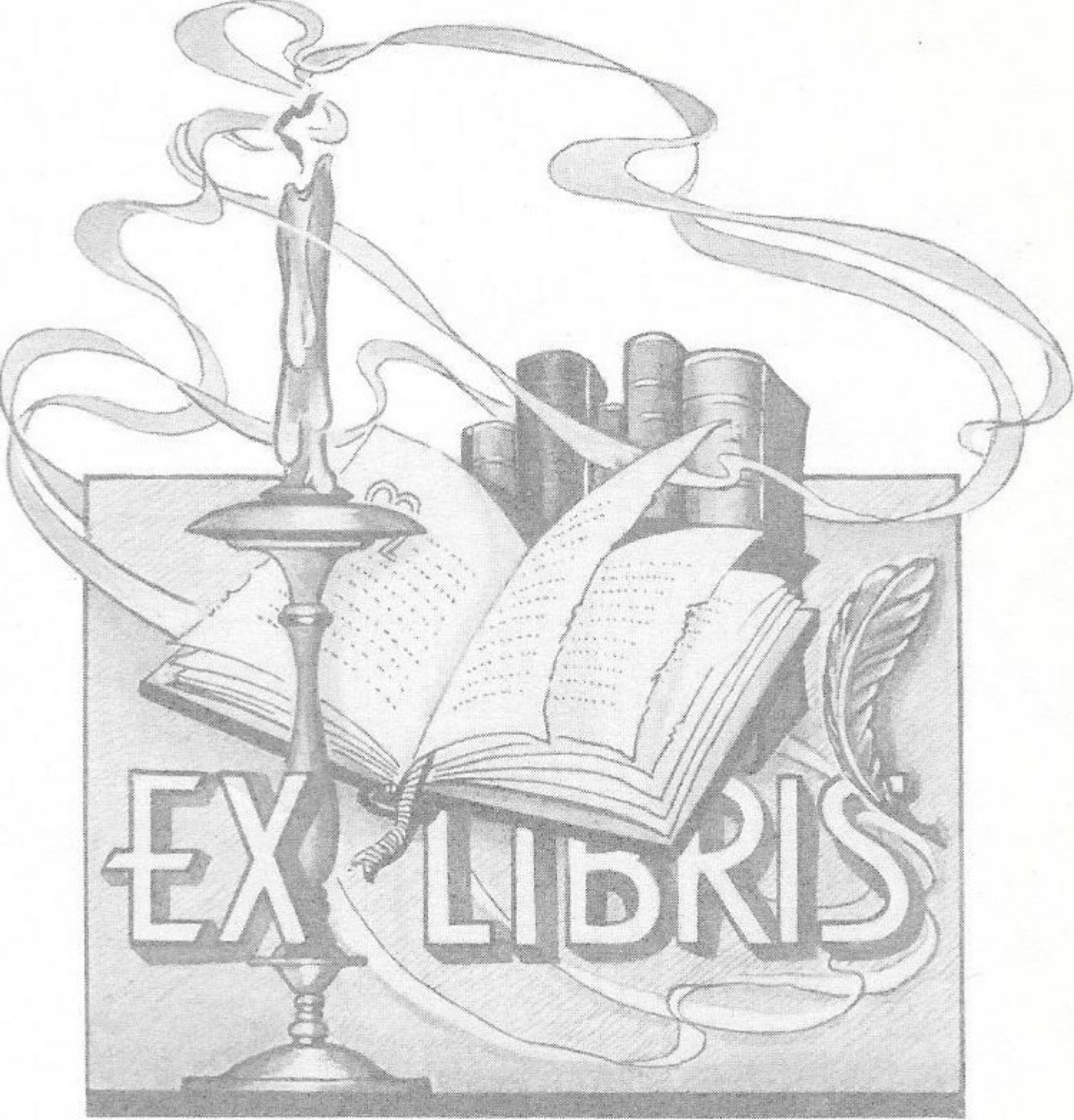
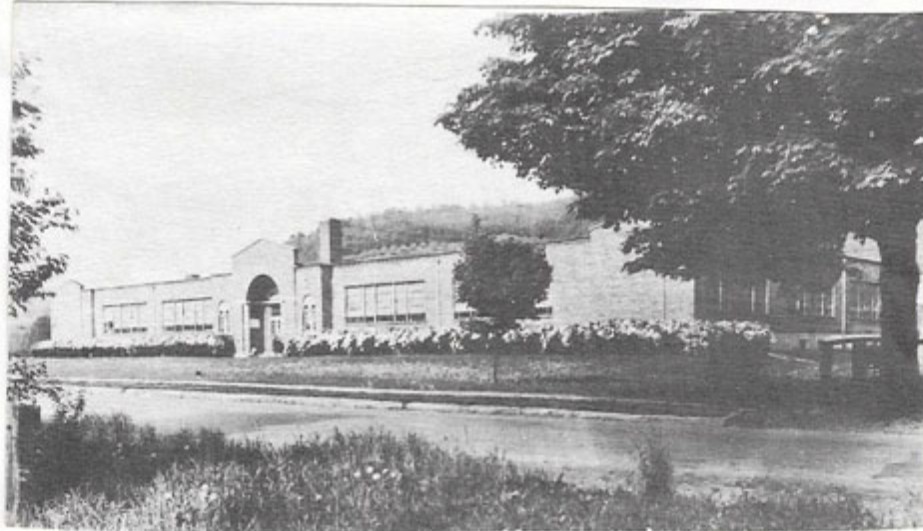

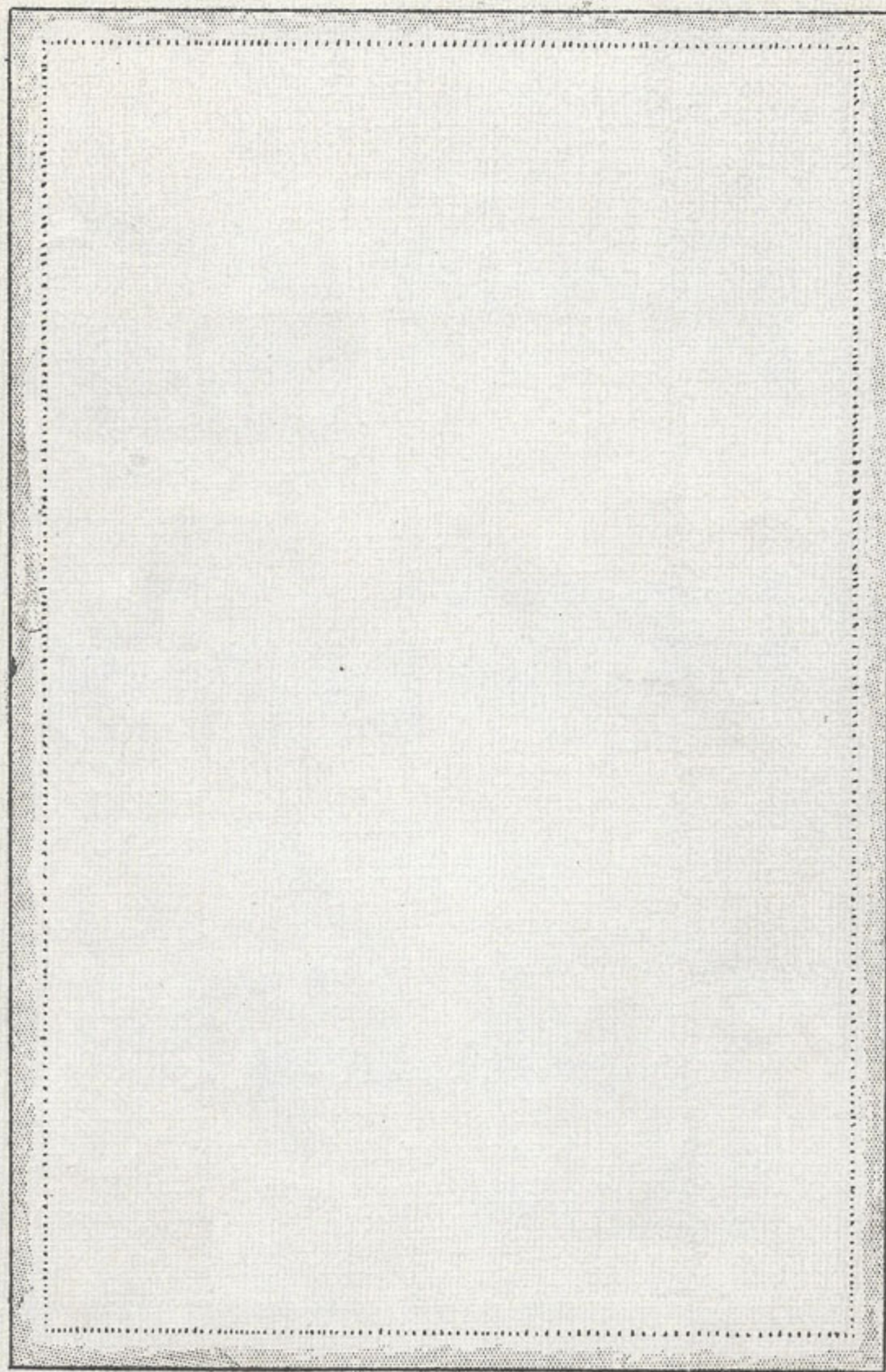

And duty never shirk.

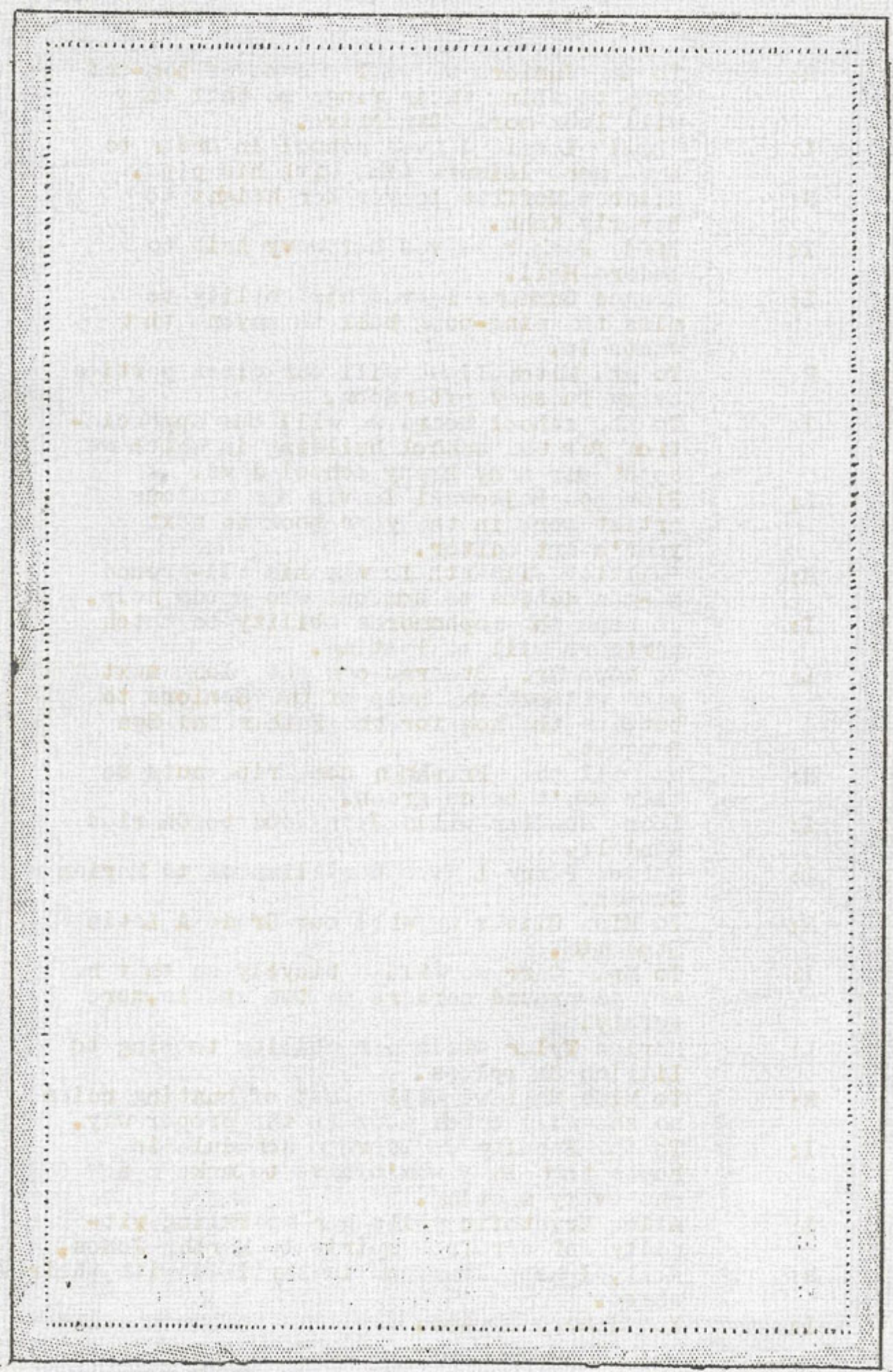
If my dreams had lasted longer on that

And happy may you be.

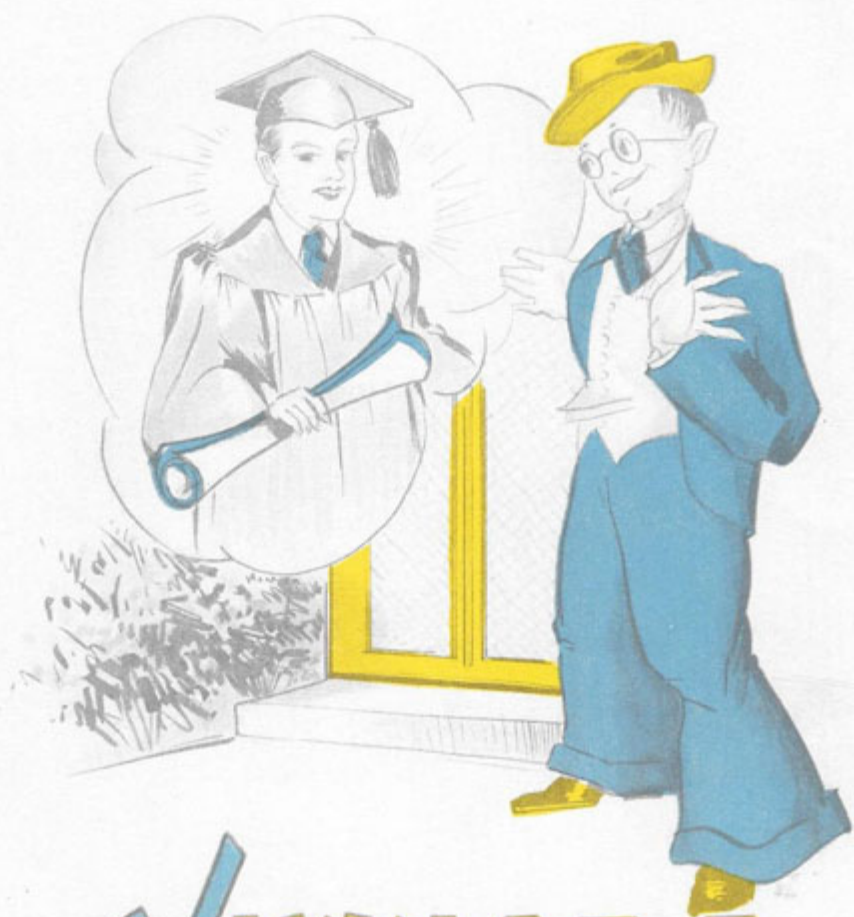
CLASS WILL
