

We spent our last day as Sophomores joyfully swimming, skating and riding a merry-go-round at En-Joy Park.

Decreased somewhat in number, but not in spirit, we were handed over to Miss Hall with Blanche as our leader. After having settled down to one schedule, in place of 5, the storm clouds gathered again. The fact that a class ring had all ready been standardized did not lessen the fact that we would not buy it. Heated arguments followed, and had not the Christian spirit entered into our hearts, we should be arguing still.



While we were learning to get along with one another, we made friends with toasted limburger cheese. Len Fennell and his orchestra furnished the music for our Junior Prom. This might have been called our first success had not someone decided to have a weiner roast with our hot-dogs---anyway we had buns.

As a reward for three years of excessive work,--Or was it play?- 32 dignified Seniors passed into Mr. Sholly's room. Choosing Miss Golos as our Class Sponsor, we started our task of raising money for our Washington trip. Our Minstrel Show proved to be a great success.



But for black-haired Jean on his knees he'd fall.


Now there's Pauline Daniels, we call her "Danny"


CLASS WILL

A series of lessons in photography is now being given at Science Club meetings by Mr. John Wilcox of Montrose.







The Boy Scout Troop is sponsored by the Parent Teacher's Association.


