## Class History

Very dimly in the back of our minds we recall the year of 1944 when as young freshmen we first entered New Milford High School.

As the morning of that first day dawned, we noticed a few new faces which we were later told were the "Jackson Gang." The girls were immediately greatly relieved to see the freshman fellows put into another part of the building. That was then, but times have changed.

The girls were directed to the Home Ec. room and put in charge of Miss Brotzman. Our desks were the tables, and our books were put on the shelves. The boys were under the guidance of Reverend Thomas.

The first year we went shyly on our way, and it wasn't until May 11, 1945, that we ventured to plan a party with the boys. It turned out to be roller skating party in Binghamton, and we liked it so well we went again on May 15. By this time the year was nearly over, so for the last day a Ross Park Picnic was planned, followed by roller skating. It was the end of a big year for the little freshmen, and the summer was greatly appreciated by the sophomores.

As sophisticate sophomores we entered school on August 27th. But even as sophisticated sophomores we were glad to get out for the Harford Fair on September 13. By this time all of our sophistication had left us, and we were the same as we always had been. The teachers decided to learn some new methods of handling us, so on October 18 we were given a vacation called Teachers' Institute.

As time crept on we decided we had to have some diversion, so on October 23 we departed for the Binghamton roller skating rink. The next day we decided sophistication was a good thing as we were all nursing black and blue spots. But our bruises didn't last long because on November 8, Reverend Thomas took the girls on a biology hike to Beaver Dam. November 19 was a joyous day for both teachers and students as we decorated for our Thanksgiving Dance. On January 25 we had our first tragedy; Mr. Laubach left us. We decided on February 18 to venture out again, so we went ice skating at Clappers. On May 11 we were happy to hear that some of our classmates had made first place in the track meet. We departed on May 28 to know that the next year would bring us back as Jolly Juniors.

Thus started our eventful junior year. On September 3, 1946, the few juniors who were left came back to school with happy faces and were put under the care of Mr. Brown. One of the first things we did was to order our class rings, and on November 27 the juniors were all excited. Our

class rings came, and everyone was buzzing hither and yonder trying to borrow or collect enough money to pay for them. It was the day before our Thanksgiving vacation, and we all wanted to get them. Coming back to school after Thanksgiving was a terrible task as we knew there would be nothing to hold our interest until Christmas vacation.

After Christmas vacation, we came back to find, you'll never guess, Mid-Term Examinations waiting for us. How happy they made us feel. But cheer up, there were better days ahead. For instance the time for our junior play was nearing. On March 28, 1947, we presented "The Dark House" which was a success. The next thing we looked forward to was the Junior Prom. We thought at first we would not be allowed to use ground pine, but it turned out O. K. From May 12 to 14 the Juniors were a busy class. We even held night school or shall we say worked night shift trying to get the pine tied and hung in time for the Prom. The night before the Prom we discovered we had run out of pine, so we went out to gather it with lanterns and flashlights. We secured enough and finished it the next morning. The hard work was well worth the effort as we all had a lot of fun on May 15. On June 2, 1947, the Juniors had become Seniors and a vacation before the eventful senior year was appreciated.

On September 2, 1947, we found ourselves at our goal, seniors. Suddenly we were disillusioned regarding our senior year. We had thought it would be one of all play and no work, but to our disappointment we soon found out how wrong we had been. On November 7, 1947, we had our senior play, "Adam's Evening," and it proved a greater success than our Junior play. Soon we started working on our Annual Harvest Ball. Buddy Howe and his all girl orchestra supplied the music; a good time was had by all.

As December 19 neared, we were very happy as we were having the first formal Christmas ball ever held in New Milford High School. We were overjoyed to find that on December 19 we had some snow left on our snow balls. On December 22 a group went to the auditorium to remove the remains of our decorations. Then the seniors had their party and for refreshments, you'll never guess what we had! Leftover punch and cookies! We then left for our last Christmas vacation in high school. After our arrival on January 5, we once again picked up our dusty books and plodded along toward examinations. We realized that the end was nearing, and we faced it with sadness in our hearts.

Class night, the first of our commencement activities, has arrived. The struggle is almost over. And now that it is really time to leave, we look back longingly and hope never to forget.
